Mae'r *Trafodion* yn defnyddio steil yr MHRA (Modern Humanities Research Association). Mae llyfryn ar gael o'r MHRA, ac mae crynodeb o'r steil ar y wefan hefyd (www.mhra.org.uk).

The *Transactions* publishes the edited texts of a selection of the lectures delivered to the Society as part of its annual programme, as well as additional refereed articles. The Editor invites writers and scholars to submit articles, in Welsh or in English, on topics relevant to the aims of the Society, to be considered for publication. Selection is based on the process of peer review by specialists in the relevant fields.

Note to contributors: articles should be submitted as a single hard copy or as an electronic file (Word document) sent by e-mail to the Editor. Articles should be no more than 7000 words, including notes. The *Transactions* uses the MHRA style guide (Modern Humanities Research Association). Copies of the style guide are available from the MHRA and a summary of the guide is also available on its web site (www.mhra.org.uk).

CYFRANWYR / CONTRIBUTORS

Dr Malcolm Ballin is a Research Associate at Cardiff University. His research focuses on literary journalism, especially Welsh, Irish and Scottish periodicals. He is the author of *Irish Periodical Culture, 1937–1972* (Palgrave Macmillan, 2008).

Gerard Charmley is a graduate of the University of Wales whose MA thesis was on D. A. Thomas and Lloyd George. He is a writer and blogger who publishes on Welsh history. His article, 'J. Vyrnwy Morgan: Wales in Another Light', appeared in *Welsh History Review* in 2008.

Dr Gwenno Ffranon is Senior Lecturer in Media and Director of Academi Hywel Teifi at Swansea University. Her main research area is the study of film and television in Wales and she is currently researching a biography of the Swansea-born actress Rachel Thomas.

Byron Huws is a graduate of Politics and Economics at the University of Exeter. He has a strong interest in heritage issues and is currently writing a work on Deheubarth in the Norman period.

Gwyn Jenkins was formerly Keeper of Manuscripts and Records and Director of Collection Services at the National Library of Wales, where he was instrumental in establishing the Welsh Political Archive and Archives Council Wales. His biography of Huw T. Edwards, *Prif Weinidog Answyddogol Cymru: Cofiant Huw T. Edwards*, was published in 2007.

The Honourable Mr Justice David Lloyd Jones is a High Court Judge and the Senior Presiding Judge of Wales. He is Chairman of the Lord Chancellor's Standing Committee on the Welsh Language and Deputy Chairman of the Parliamentary Boundary Commission for Wales.

Dr J. Graham Jones is a long-serving Senior Archivist and Head of the Welsh Political Archive at the National Library of Wales, Aberystwyth. He is the author of *David Lloyd George and Welsh Liberalism*, published by the Library in June 2010.

Sir Emyr Jones Parry is a career diplomat. Formerly the British Permanent Representative to the United Nations, he was appointed Chairman of the All Wales Convention set up by the Welsh Assembly Government in 2007 to review the constitutional framework of the Assembly. He is currently the President of Aberystwyth University.

Professor Teresa Rees is Professor of Social Sciences and Pro-Vice-Chancellor for Research at Cardiff University. Her research focuses on methods of embedding equality into political and social systems, and women and science policy in Europe. She was a member of the Steering Group which set up the Equality and Human Rights Commission and has acted as expert adviser to the Research Directorate-General of the European Commission.

Hilary Yewlett is a graduate of Swansea University and a retired teacher. Following the completion of an Advanced Diploma in Local History at the University of Oxford and a Master's degree from the University of Cambridge, she is now writing a Ph.D. thesis on Welsh local history at Swansea University.
